Dear readers, Dear friends,

It seems like yesterday, but it was last year in fact, that we extended our best wishes for 2022 to you... without knowing what this new year would bring...

In spring, we were delighted to resume our activities and as if we wanted to 'make up for lost time', the pace was fast and you attended our activities in great numbers: thank you all very much!

They ranged from the Public History Meetings and study days dedicated to young historians to colloquia about the Resistance, about the 10th anniversary of the new *RBHC*, and the presentation of the results of the Postwarex project, and conferences about the Cold War, occupation during the First World War, and about media and cultural life in general in occupied Wester Europe (1940-1945)... It was a busy year indeed, with a lot of 'closed' events also that took place at our premises located Square de l'Aviation, such as the meeting of EHRI project partners or the different gatherings for the project "Résolution-Métis", and many more...

Also in 2022, the project 'Wikibase Résistance' was fast-tracked: Half a million data about intelligence officers and resistance activists involved in the resistance in Belgium are now accessible thanks to a highly motivated and ever-increasing team volunteers who fed the databases. Today, there are fifteen volunteers, and five people joined the

team this year alone.

Several researchers have joined us, studying the role of the national railway company SNCB/NMBS in the deportations of the Second World War or the Resistance in Flanders, or who work on the Belcowar project about Belgium and the Cold War within the framework of FED-tWIN (joint initiative by the State Archives and KULeuven).

Four issues of *Revue belge d'Histoire contemporaine* were published, one of which was dedicated to the Resistance.

Since a couple of months we also have a new and more up-to-date catalogue (Vubis) as a tool to access our library; our archives are now fully integrated in the catalogue of the State Archives (Search) and the first inventory in the new "CegeSoma" series has just been published ... many more will follow.

A few novelties for this end of the year...

First, a new concept of decentralised conferences geared towards the large public about collaboration and repression in Flanders: the 'Oorlogscafés', an initiative taken within the framework of FED-tWIN (State Archives/CegeSoma – Ghent University) and organised by the Davidsfonds, has already been a great success and will be continued in 2023.

Next, a new section on the website of CegeSoma is dedicated to research into the Cold War, in addition to the topics already presented, namely the First and Second World Wars.

But what would such a track record be without you all?

Every year, you place your trust in us, you turn to us in order to learn more about various aspects of history. You follow us on social networks, you 'like' our Facebook posts, you watch our videos, you sign up for our Newsletters and you increasingly visit our website Belgium WWII that was expanded by many papers in the past year (the site now has almost 750 entries). You also help enrich our collections by proposing donations.

Thanks a lot for these encouragements and your unwavering support! They in turn encourage us to go on, to continue our research, to share history from above and below, and to write history with you...

We are looking forward to seeing you again in 2023 in our reading rooms or at our events, or to simply address your questions and requests for information in the best possible manner.

MEMORY, KNOWLEDGE AND ASSESSMENT OF THE SECOND WORLD WAR.



The CegeSoma/State Archives in collaboration with Ghent University is currently carrying out a study about the social history and impact of the Second World War within the framework of the FED-tWIN project People@War. You can help us by filling out the questionnaire (approximately 15 minutes) which is part of a long-term research project. This study aims to, among others, compare the responses with previous public surveys (from the 1980s and 2000s) and help us, through content analysis, identify models that will allow us to better understand the manner in which our vision of the past is shaped, significantly or not, by all sorts of factors.

In practice, all topics should be considered, but if you do not wish to respond to particular questions or if they are not applicable or, conversely, if you would like to expand on your answers, this is not a problem. You only need to provide an e-mail address to participate.

At the end of the questionnaire, we also ask if you have any sources that could help expand and enrich research into the Second World War through the testimonies of people who experienced it. In particular, we are thinking of personal diaries, but other sources of interest include letters, photographs, memoirs and, potentially, other types of relevant documents.

Partners are the Davidsfonds and the State Archives-CegeSoma. The goal is to share knowledge and findings from scientific research into collaboration and repression with the large public in an informal, café-like setting.

Upon registration, attendees will be given access to some 20 webinars of maximum 10 minutes about topics related to collaboration and repression. Once registered, you can also ask questions in advance that will be summarised and adressed at the event. "*Oorlogscafés*" are organised in every Flamish province.

Fourth and last edition of the RBHC 2022 published.



The section 'debate' about the decolonisation is already online and contains seven papers of historians and archivists who shed light on various aspects of this complex and very topical subject.

Three papers are also published in this edition. The first one is penned by Wendy Wiertz and has a close look at a very particular aspect of the development of international humanitarian aid, namely the backing of the handmade lacework sector in occupied Belgium during the First World War. The second, by Gaétan du Roy and Lionel Francou, is based on the conclusions of a research workshop and formulates recommendations for a more standardised interdisciplinary approach with regard to contemporary history. Finally, the last article is authored by Manon Mortier and scrutinises the underground in order to study the persecution of the Jews in Belgium during the Second World War. This fourth edition is rounded off with a series of summaries of doctoral theses and reviews of publications.

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Press clippings, a discrete and somewhat forgotten source of information.

The "press clippings" section (hundreds of boxes) exists since the creation of our institution but has gotten somewhat forgotten nowadays, which is rather unfortunate, as they have been repackaged and made fit for today's world and can prove useful to researchers and historians. They were initially subdivided into a series of topics which formed the subsections: Généralités (general course of the conflict), the specific productions of the Centre and what the press said about them (positive of negative), the bibliography "Seconde Guerre mondiale" published in the journals and the weeklies, and the series "Personalia" (containing the names of more or less illustrious people in alphabetical order). It goes without saying that some sections have aged less well. Indeed, the section about the global history was initially the most abundant and reflected, even among the main titles, the average views of journalists in of the generation 1970-2000, which were often avid of military history and, to a lesser extent, political history. With regard to local newspapers, anecdotes were often predominant or at best an accumulation of well-known facts of History with a capital H. It occurred that one or the other reflection stuck out of the common lot of this prose, but this was a rare if not extremely rare feat. In addition, the journalistic papers collated at the time for a potential historiography of the institution seem quite of no avail today, as this history has already been written indeed.



However. the section about bibliographies of modern people involved in the conflict (over one hundred boxes) might turn out to be guite useful. When it comes to well-known people of this period of time, the selection of press clippings, which was collected in a systematic manner and on the basis of a broad sample via the company "Auxipress", still offers a rather complete view of the opinion (or the journal's opinion) about any given person. For "illustrious strangers" (people of importance at lower level, local resistance fighters or collaborators, locally famous people), the collection is also of interest for

amateur historians or learned persons active in countless local historical and archaeological associations. Indeed, for those researchers, what matter is what happened at Hoût-Si-Ploû and Erembodegem from 1940 to 1944, and rather less so what happened in Stalingrad and El-Alamein... And those people will surely find one or the other bibliographical reference, be it merely in the form of an obituary, that they will not find elsewhere.

This is why a thorough and reasoned selection was carried out and the Press Clippings sections ("Coupures de presse") shall again be open for research to the public via our VUBIS catalogue, in an adapted format in the course of the coming year.

Surely, one will find a gem or two for research.

Spirou in the torment of the Shoah



On 9 December 2022, an exhibition about *Spirou in the torment of the Shoah* opened at the Mémorial de la Shoah in Paris. So how did our rascal bell-boy end up in the torment of the Second World War?

The exhibition bears on the four comic books by Émile Bravo titled "L'Espoir malgré tout", published between 2018 and 2022. In these books, the author refers to the painter Felix Nussbaum and his wife Felka Platek who was an artist as well. As an exiled Jewish couple they took refuge in Brussels, where they hid in an attic located Rue Archimède until they were eventually denounced by a neighbour and arrested. They were deported with the last convoy that left the Dossin barracks on 31 July 1944. Both were murdered in Auschwitz.

An exhibition with different approaches



Through original plates, archive documents and works by Felix Nussbaum, the exhibition depicts Belgium under occupation, from the earliest hours of the invasion until the Liberation. It also addresses the history of the *Journal de Spirou*. This weekly magazine was launched in 1938 and owned by editor Jean Dupuis who fled to England at the beginning of the conflict. During the war, his two sons and his son-in-law took charge of the

enterprise. The magazine continued to be published until the occupant started to meddle with it a bit too intensively. Then came up the genius idea of letting the characters live on through a puppet theatre, the Théâtre du Farfadet, that toured the country as of December 1942 under the firm direction of André Moons. *Le Journal de Spirou* ceased to be published.

What is interesting about this exhibition is that it makes a difficult history accessible to a large public, including young people. Through the adventures of Spirou and his encounter with Felix Nussbaum and Felka Platek, readers are confronted with the reality of the occupation in Belgium: from collaboration to resistance, and from resignation to deportation, many aspects are presented both through the written rigorousness of documents and the artistic detachment of drawings. The exhibition also covers the more ambiguous personal path of Hergé and his character Tintin, a great rival of Spirou, and the state of the comic strip art in the post-war period.

The key role of Jean Doisy

The creation of the Théâtre du Farfadet is largely due to one Georges Evrard, alias Jean Doisy. He joined the editorial staff of *Moustique* in 1932 and was both an author and scriptwriter. He became the editor in chief of the *Journal de Spirou* while also getting involved in politics. Among other things, he participated in the establishment of the (Belgian) League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism together with his friend Émile Hambresin who died in deportation in 1943. During the war, both were active in the Front de l'Indépendance. Hambresin is furthermore one of the co-founders of the Comité de Défense des Juifs. Among their acquaintances was also Victor Martin who led a secret exploration mission to Auschwitz in early 1943. Jean Doisy also recruited Suzanne Moons who helped save some 600 Jewish children and was the brother of André Moons, presenter of the Théâtre du Farfadet.

Participation of CegeSoma

Having been solicited by exhibition commissioner Didier Pasamonik, CegeSoma contributed to the exhibition through document loans and the writing of a number of captions and of the catalogue. It is richly illustrated and contains texts by Pascal Ory, Bernard Krouck, Tal Bruttmann, Laurence Schram, Joël Kotek, Caroline François, Chantal Kesteloot, Romain Blandre, Didier Pasamonik, and Bertrand and Christelle Pissavy-Yvernault.

This free exhibition is open until August 2023 at the Mémorial de la Shoah in Paris.
